



Internship Eligibility and Substitute Coursework

You must have cumulative and major grade point averages of 2.40 in order to be eligible for an internship. Students must meet the GPA requirements at the beginning of the first semester of their senior year in order to apply for an internship for the following semester.

If you do not meet the required GPA going into your first semester senior year, you should first meet with the academic advisor to confirm you can raise your grade point averages (major and cumulative) to a 2.40 by the end of the semester.

If it is possible to raise your GPA by the end of the first semester senior year, these are your options:

- 1) You can choose to complete 12 hours of regular course work chosen in consultation with the advisor in lieu of performing an internship. See below for pre-approved courses. *-OR-*
- 2) After signing a GPA contract with the internship coordinator, you will be able to apply for an internship. You are strongly encouraged to register for 12 hours of substitute course work in case you are not able to raise your grade point averages. You will be allowed to apply for an internship, and you will be able to perform the internship upon confirmation of your grade point averages at the end of the semester. If you are not eligible, you will not be able to do the internship and will need to complete substitute course work.

You have to select from the following list of classes that you have not taken. Be sure to check for pre-requisites, as well as major blocks. Overrides cannot be granted by the CJS advisor for courses outside of this major.
